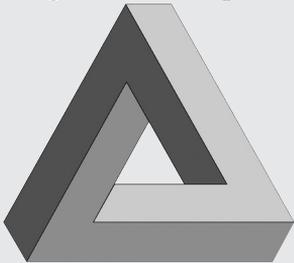
And the newest and perhaps the mother of all contradictions — “Social Distancing.”
